It's always difficult to let students go on to the next grade when they have been yours for a whole school year. They are just too bright and full of potential to hold back! So we will finish strong, enjoying our last weeks learning together. We are reading up a storm, focusing a bit more on nonfiction books as we end the year. Every student has happily transitioned into chapter books and are well on their way to becoming lifelong readers! Life cycles is the focus in science and we are thrilled to be raising ladybugs! 7th Grade Stars Ms. McDonald

It's the final countdown! I can't believe that we are almost to the end of the year. Time sure has gone fast. Every year around this time I start to get a little sad because soon the 8th graders I have had for multiple years will not be joining me again next year, but I also get a little excited for the new year to come. As always, we have been staying busy in math and science. We started off the month of March with MARCH MAMMAL MADNESS! Students learned about different animals and then chose winners for different competitions. There is always heartbreak in tournament situations, and there were some major upsets, but the Great White Shark came out as the overall victor. The students had a great time with this project. In 8th grade science, we have been studying how Earth looks today and the theory of plate tectonics. In 7th grade science, students are finishing up their chapter on principles of ecology. We investigated survival of the fittest with a beak lab and we created butterflies that were later hunted by predators (Mrs. Arens and Mrs. Fiscus). In 6th grade science, we talked all about matter and why it matters (excuse the poor pun). We played with monster muck (ooblek) and determined that it is neither a solid or liquid but a colloid! It sure was a lot of fun! Now on to math. All three classes have started their geometry unit. In 8th grade, we have used the Pythagorean Theorem to solve for missing side lengths of triangles. In 7th grade, students are learning about congruent and similar polygons. Finally, in 6th grade, students are currently working on finding areas of different figures, but we are moving towards finding volumes and surface area as well. The rest of the year will continue to move quickly but we still have a lot to learn. I can't wait to see what else these students have in store for me!

It's hard to believe that it is coming to an end of another school year! The students have been very busy throughout the fourth quarter. In 8th grade reading, the students finished the book Animal Farm by George Orwell and watched a movie based on the book. For English classes, the students finished writing an informative essay and chapters on capital letters, punctuation, and a chapter on sentence diagramming. Our annual Lincoln field trip was a fun time had by all! Thank you to Erin Foxhoven and Aliza Stout for driving. For 7th grade reading, the students read the book The Outsiders by S.E. Hinton and then enjoyed watching the movie. In English the students work on an informative essay, and chapters involving capitalization, punctuation, and sentence diagramming. The 6th grade English classes spent time on the use of pronouns, descriptive adjectives, demonstrative adjectives, demonstrative pronouns, colons, semicolons, and articles. For reading skills, the students learned about summarizing, theme, point of view, alliteration, assonance, homographs, free-verse fiction, and figurative language. The students in 6th grade are working toward a free ride pass for the Knox County Fair. They must have 100 points by May 1. All students in grades 6–8 have a goal of 25 A.R. points per quarter. If they do not earn those points per quarter, they will receive a grade based on the points they have achieved.
